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### THE FIRST WORD

AS STUDENTS AND FACULTY return for fall term, they will find several enhancements to Hannon Library's electronic resources and services. Over the summer, our electronic resources librarian implemented software that allows users to navigate from a citation in a database to an online journal article or information on the print version in our collection. Other librarians were busy reconfiguring computers, thereby increasing student access to campus software applications, as well as providing access to Hannon Library information and electronic resources. By subscribing to the electronic resource *Westlaw Campus Research and Play Index*, the library continues to move from standard reference print resources to electronic versions.

Through grant funding, we have collaborated with Southern Oregon Historical Society, the Jackson County Library System, and Josephine County Library System to create the Southern Oregon History Collection. We have scanned and indexed a number of materials, and even more will continue to be added throughout the fall. We hope to be awarded a grant extension, which will enable us to add more primary source materials through partnerships with other southern Oregon organizations.

As promised, we are continuing our popular free lecture series. Noted wildlife biologist Pepper Trail will start off the series with a program on nature, which will incorporate several literary genres. Michael Jensen, a recent library donor and authority on Shakespeare in popular culture, will speak about OSF's radio productions. Later in the fall, respected local artists Bruce Bayard and Betty LaDuke will talk about their work. Several of Bayard's digital prints hang outside the Meese Meeting Room, and we will also host a concurrent showing of LaDuke's work in our exhibit area.

Please join us for lectures, utilize our collections (both digital and print), and seek assistance with your research and information needs from our friendly and informative staff.

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# BOOKMARKS

## LIBRARY NEWS

### COSTUMES ON DISPLAY IN HANNON LIBRARY

THE SECOND-FLOOR CORNER EXHIBIT CASE displays a costume from the SOU Theatre Department's 2006 production of *The Jungle Book*. Later in October, this will be replaced by an exhibit from the Oregon Shakespeare Festival. The second-floor wall display case contains materials from the Michael P. Jensen Collection of Shakespeare in Popular Culture and Mass Media. The Jensen Collection was acquired by Hannon Library in 2006. An expert on Shakespeare in popular culture, Jensen will present a lecture about OSF's experiences in presenting Shakespearean productions on the radio. The lecture is scheduled for October 30 at 4 p.m. in the library.

### LIBRARY EXHIBITS

THE HANNON LIBRARY GALLERY, located on the third floor, features a series of continually changing exhibits of artwork created by students, faculty, and community artists.

Our current exhibition is a collection of sports photographs by Ken Royce. *Game Day*, featuring photographs of SOU sporting events, runs through October. Ken works in the Admissions Office on campus and is a freelance photographer.

In November, Hannon Library Gallery will feature paintings by Ashland artist and SOU Emeritus Professor Betty LaDuke. Titled *Chiapas, Mexico—Land and Liberty: The Zapatista Murals of Chiapas*, this series of paintings was inspired by Betty's global exchange tour to Zapatista communities in Chiapas, Mexico, in 2003. This exhibit coincides with a lecture by Professor LaDuke, to be held on November 16 at 4 p.m. in the Meese Meeting Room.

### STUDENT ACCESS TO LIBRARY COMPUTERS ENHANCED

HANNON LIBRARY IS CHANGING the way computers in Reference and Government Publications can be accessed. All twenty-eight computers in these areas will be configured with campus logins. Previously, students only had campus network access on twelve computers, and the remaining sixteen were configured for Internet access only and had a separate printing system. Students were required to purchase a separate printing account to print from these computers, which led to a great deal of frustration. There were also fewer machines available with access to standard computer applications.

Students will now be able to access the same software on all of the computers in Reference and Government Publications as they do in other labs in the library and on campus. The public will be required to obtain temporary login accounts, good for one hour of Internet access per twenty-four-hour period. Public patrons can obtain the temporary Internet logins at the circulation desk on the first floor.

### DATABASE NEWS

HANNON LIBRARY NOW PROVIDES access to WestLaw Campus Research. This online resource includes analytical sources such as American Jurisprudence, American Law Reports, and full-text access to more than 800 law reviews and journals, as well as primary law sources like the U.S. Code Annotated, the Code of Federal Regulations, all federal and state cases, and European Union law.

The library's print version of Wilson's Play Index has been replaced by an online edition that makes finding information about plays much easier. Users can access citations and full publication details for more than 30,000 plays and 500 monologues published individually or in collections since 1949. Descriptive annotations summarize plots and indicate musical requirements. Users can search by title, author, subject, style, genre, cast type, and more.

### Library Acquires Significant Contributions

#### MICHAEL P. JENSEN COLLECTION OF SHAKESPEARE IN POPULAR CULTURE AND MASS MEDIA

HANNON LIBRARY HAS ACQUIRED the Michael P. Jensen Collection of Shakespeare in Mass Media and Popular Culture. The collection represents Shakespeare-related materials derived or adapted from, inspired by, or mentioning Shakespeare. These materials are available to scholars, researchers, and others interested in the artifacts of this burgeoning field of academic study. This unique Shakespearean collection pulls together diverse materials and formats, including films, television productions, radio shows, audiobooks, comic books, comic strips, novels, short stories, plays, art, toys, dolls, games, postcards, bookmarks, and other items related to Shakespeare and his characters. Based on the idea that today's junk mail will be interesting a hundred years from now, marketing materials from publishers of Shakespearean books and Shakespeare Festivals have been collected and cataloged by year, along with a wide variety of theatre programs.

Jensen will contribute new items to the collection annually as he continues to collect and catalog. A finding guide is being created to assist users in accessing this important collection. Jensen is assisting in this process by writing summary descriptions for many of the items.

On October 30, Jensen will present a lecture titled "The Oregon Shakespeare Festival's Thirty-Two Years on the Radio" (Meese Meeting Room, 4 p.m.). Shakespeariana from the Jensen Collection will also be on display in the second-floor exhibit case.

#### OTHER CONTRIBUTIONS

HANNON LIBRARY HAS RECEIVED other significant collections in recent months. Lue Douthit of Oregon Shakespeare Festival (OSF) gave Hannon Library an important collection of 387 volumes about theatre and the arts.

Noted author and artist Tee Corinne of Wolf Creek, Oregon, has given the library 185 books to enhance our art and women's studies collections.

Mary and Dean Collins, formerly of Rogue River, Oregon, have added to our growing collection of American Indian resources with their gift of more than 400 publications and manuscripts.

Our collection of books and periodicals relating to enology and viticulture is growing due to recent contributions to the Sarah Powell Tribute Fund, established in her memory. Dr.

Will Brown, Raymond Holdridge, RoxyAnn Winery, Gail Unzelman, Les and Rachael Martin, and Randy Gold have donated wine books and journals, or funds to purchase wine-related publications.

Current and emeritus SOU faculty are important contributors to Hannon Library, and their gifts ensure that students have access to necessary literature. Faculty contributors include: Dennis Dunleavy (Communication), Richard Frey (Emeritus, History), Greg Jones (Geography), Art Kreisman (Emeritus, Humanities), Jeff LaLande (Anthropology), Dennis Powers (Business), Vic Sims (Criminology and Criminal Justice), Chris Skrepetos (Emeritus, Biology), Paul Steinkle (Provost's Office, Communication), Karen Sundwick (History), and President Emeritus Elisabeth Zinser.

Michael Hays of Ashland donated 34 books of literary criticism and history to add to the nearly 1,500 he had previously donated.

Dr. William Kirkman gave Hannon Library 118 counseling and psychology publications.

Donald and Kathleen Provence of Ashland, Oregon, donated 485 books.

We received a set of monumental brass rubbings for Special Collections from Marie Kuehl of Talent, Oregon.

We lack space to acknowledge all of the people who donated books and other materials to the library in recent months. However, these generous gifts are much appreciated!

### DIGITAL HISTORY COLLECTION GOES LIVE!

HANNON LIBRARY IS PLEASED to announce that the digital Southern Oregon History Collection (SOHC) is available for public use. The collection offers digitized books, government documents, maps, and other materials from Jackson, Josephine, Coos, Curry, and Douglas Counties. Materials for this 2006 grant-funded project are from the following project partners: the Southern Oregon Historical Society (SOHS), Jackson County Library Services, the Josephine County Library System, and Hannon Library. All documents are being scanned at Hannon Library, where metadata (descriptions about each document) is added to enhance searching and access.

A variety of materials are being added to the digital collection. The Southern Oregon Historical Society has graciously loaned the Albert A. Cedros Collection of letters and documents about the founding of the Veterans Administration Domiciliary in White City. Jackson County Library Services contributed *Ordinances of the Town of Jacksonville 1860-1876*. Also included is an interesting title from the Josephine County Library System, *Josephine County As It Is! Climate and Resource: Facts and Information for Those Intending to Make Homes in the Glowing West!* (1877).

The SOHC project is supported by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) through the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA), administered through the Oregon State Library.

The SOHC is the newest collection in the Southern Oregon Digital Archives (SODA), which was begun by an Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) grant awarded in 2001. Users can connect to SODA from the library's home page ([www.sou.edu/library](http://www.sou.edu/library)) or from the SODA home page (<http://soda.sou.edu>). The link for the History Collection features images of gold-mining and pear culture, two elements of historic economy and land use in Southern Oregon. You can also access the history collection directly at: <http://soda.sou.edu/history.html>.

A proposal to extend the SOHC project through January 2008 has been submitted to the Oregon State Library. If successful, the new grant application will allow borrowing materials from additional partner organizations in Coos, Curry, and Douglas Counties and will provide access to selected documents from the Rogue River National Forest Historical Records Collection.

### SFX: WHAT'S THAT?

OVER THE SUMMER, Hannon Library installed SFX "link resolver" software, which makes it significantly easier to find online journal articles. Before, when a user found a citation in an online index (database), they had to click several times to find the actual article. This included navigating to our listing of journals and then through a different database that contained a link to the actual article. Finding an article could take several complicated steps.

Now, with one click, a user can see exactly where the article is located. One more click brings up the article. Even better, the new link resolver software makes the process very similar for almost all databases, making researching and finding articles more straightforward and user-friendly.

What exactly is link resolver software? SFX, like other link resolver software, brings together information from citations in library databases with information about the library's print and online journal subscriptions, as well as content in other databases and library policies and services. The SFX link resolver software is activated when users click on a link embedded in a database. Utilizing the OpenURL standard, users are presented with options for locating the article, such as a link to the online article, a link to the library's catalog for print holding information, or a link to request an interlibrary loan.

Installing SFX is an important step toward providing easy access and desktop delivery of articles in our evolving information environment. SFX also generates a customized, alphabetical journal title list for Hannon Library's Web site.
